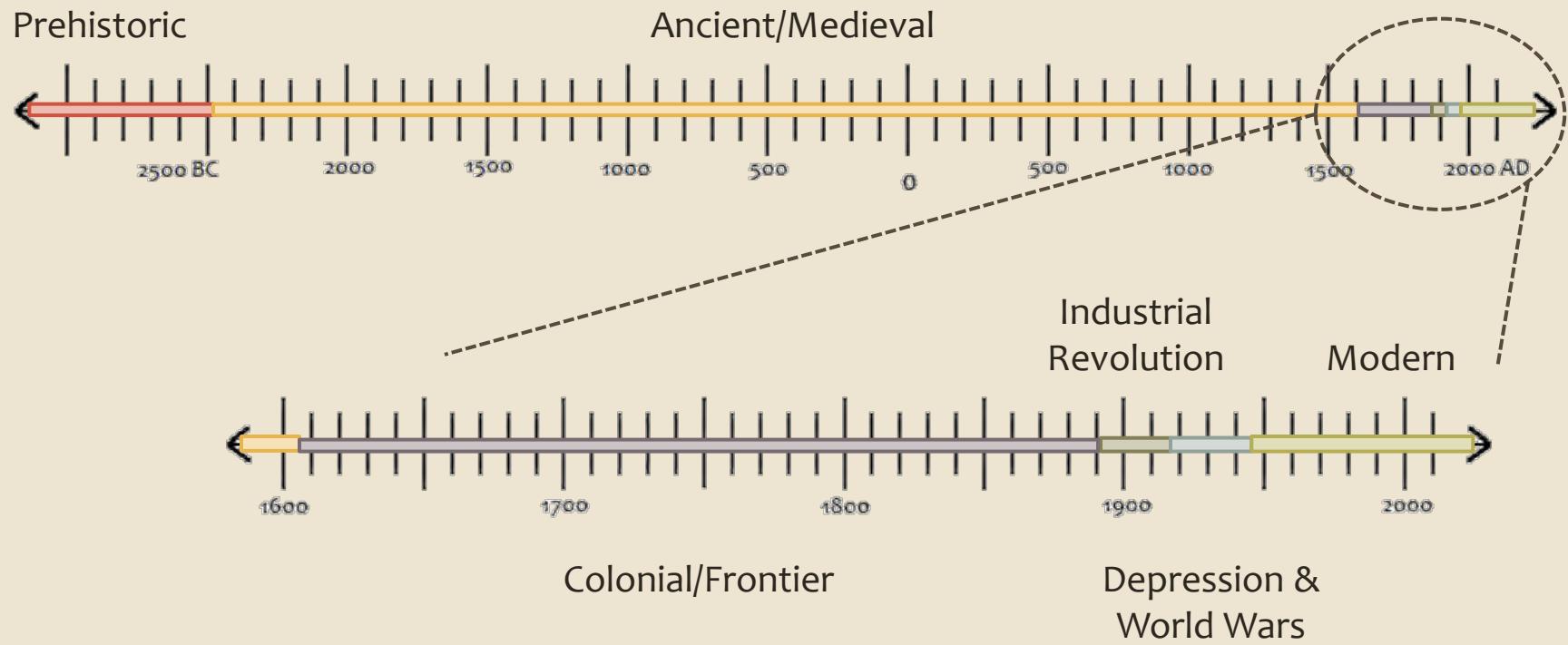

 - Survival



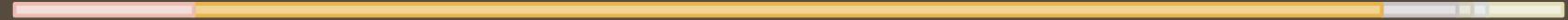

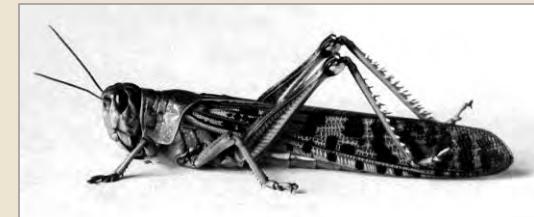

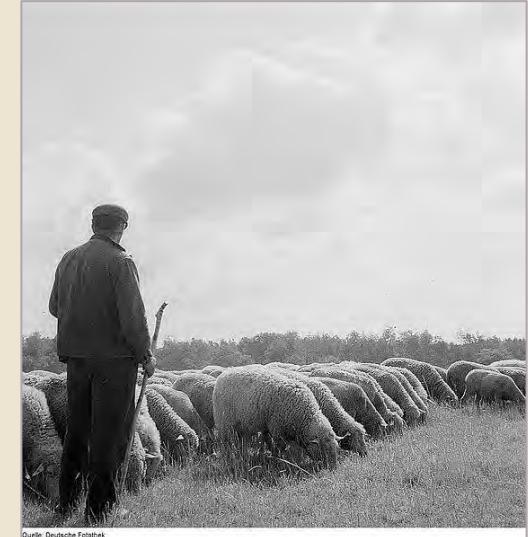

MESSRS. RATS AND Co.—Having taken quite a deep interest in your welfare in regard to your winter quarters I thought I would drop you a few lines which might be of some considerable benefit to you in the future seeing that you have pitched your winter quarters at the summer residence of * * * * No. 1 Seaview Street, I wish to inform you that you will be very much disturbed during cold winter months as I am expecting to be at work through all parts of the house, shall take down ceilings, take up floors, and clean out every substance that would serve to make you comfortable, likewise there will be nothing left for you to feed on, as I shall remove every eatable substance; so you had better take up your abode elsewhere. I will here refer you to the farm of * * * * No. 6 Incubator Street, where you will find a splendid cellar well filled with vegetations of (all) kinds besides a shed leading to a barn, with a good supply of grain, where you can live snug and happy. - Constant risk of starvation
- (Economics)
- Manifest destiny
 - Elimination of “bad” wildlife
 - Taming of the wilderness

COLONIAL AND FRONTIER AMERICA



- Native American techniques
 - Platforms for throwing stones at birds
- Hunting and trapping
 - Bounties
 - Predators
 - Nuisance bird species
 - Blackbirds
 - Crows
 - Passenger pigeons



INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION



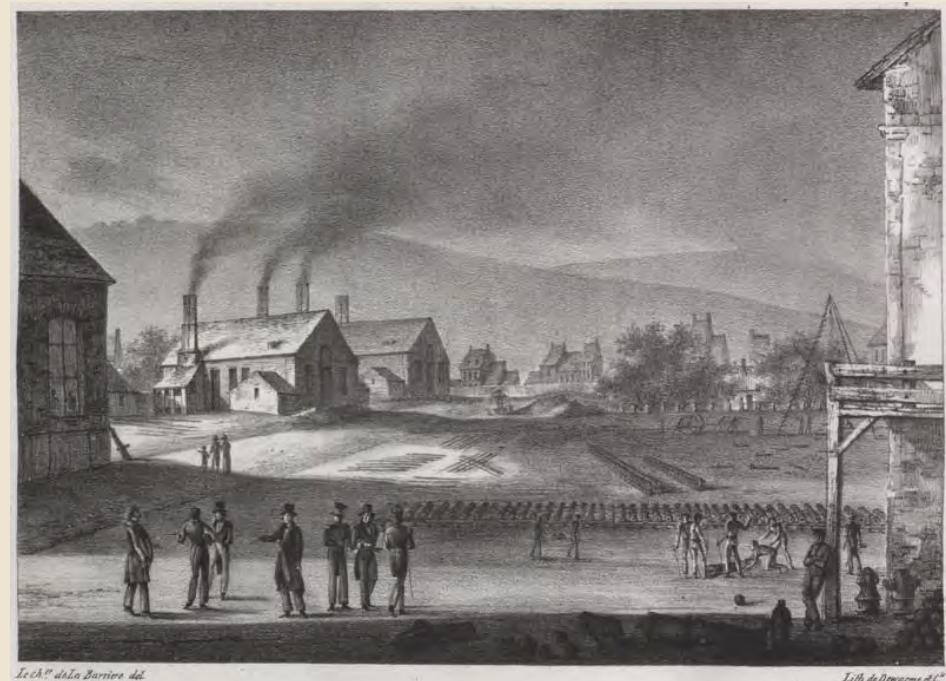
1890 AD – 1914 AD



INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION



- Increased, efficient production of food
- Decreased sense of predator threat
- Stable economy



INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION



- Nostalgia for lost wilderness
 - 1890 – closing of the frontier
- Sport hunting and game conservation
 - Theodore Roosevelt
 - Redefining of “good” and “bad” wildlife
- Spiritual and intrinsic values
 - John Muir

INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION



- New tool: Education
 - 1885 – First WDM appropriation from Congress
 - USDA Branch of Economic Ornithology
 - Questionnaires about bird damage
- Beginning of WDM as a profession

THE GREAT DEPRESSION AND WORLD WARS



- Food shortages, high prices
 - Increased funds for predator management
- Economic concerns
- Back to utilitarian
 - Managing for “useful” wildlife and against “harmful” wildlife

THE GREAT DEPRESSION AND WORLD WARS



- Increased \$ for predator control
 - Toxins
 - Trapping
 - Shooting

MODERN AMERICA



- Abundant food, safety, and leisure time
- Increased population
- Urbanization
 - Urban sprawl/decreased open space
 - Diversification of land use
- Conflict between local “commodity” interests and environmental interests
 - Rural vs. urban
 - Hunters vs. anti-hunters

MODERN AMERICA



- Media as experience
- Silent Spring values and viewpoints
 - Environment is fragile and interconnected
 - Leopold Report (1964)
 - Cain Report (1972)

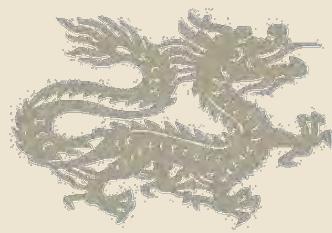


MODERN AMERICA



- Increasing professionalism of WDM
 - GI Bill → increased number of wildlife biologists
 - University classes
 - Professional organizations and conferences
- Human dimensions studies
- Private-sector wildlife control
 - Ability to pay someone else > damage tolerance

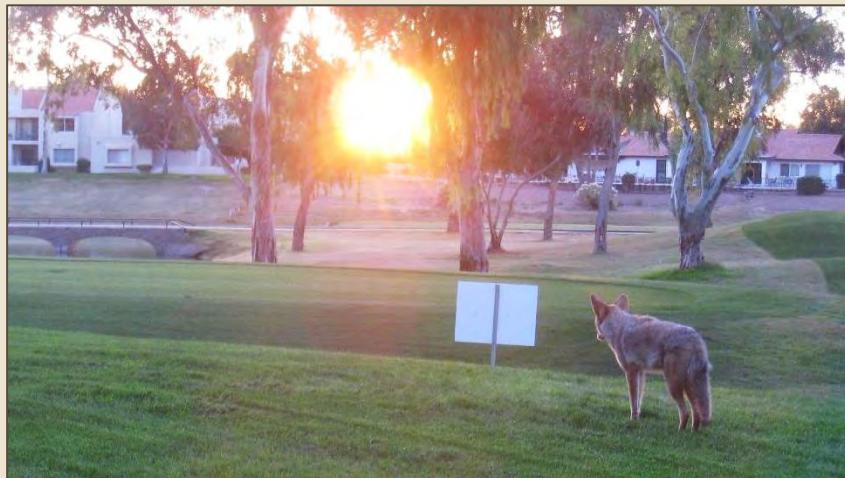
